Arthur Arlen Kee

February 23, 1933 – December 26, 2022



We are sad to report the passing of our friend and fiddle player Art Kee. So many of us have such fond memories of Art. He was a delightful, vibrant & dedicated musician and champion fiddler as well as a well respected fiddle contest judge

Arthur Arlen Kee was born in Vineyard, Texas, growing up with his mother, father, brother, and sister. He was always a bright student and a lovable guy. At a young age, he learned how to play the fiddle, which ignited his love for music.

Dropping out of high school to help support his family, Art soon joined the Navy where he was shipped to the Philippines for a few years of service. After his service, he moved to California where he finished high school, graduated San Jose State University, and started his career in city planning. He enjoyed a fruitful career in city planning, making notable contributions during his employment with the City of Sunnyvale and City of Campbell, where he eventually retired as Planning Director.

After college, he started a family, having two kids, John and Jennifer. While working for the City of Campbell, he met Barbara, his beloved wife of over 30 years. They enjoyed many wonderful years together filled with travel, friends, and laughter.

After retiring, he spent time traveling to play music with friends and in competitions, winning 1st place in the 2005 National Oldtime Fiddlers' Contest Senior-Senior Division in Weiser, Idaho.

I traveled to Sweden a few years ago and wish to put in a plug for my tour guide who did a super, super, super, super job!

I've had the pleasure of traveling to Sweden a few years ago, in fact twice! and hope to visit there again. However, it'll have to wait until I've gathered more info about my ancestors from Uppland (a province in Sweden). Here's a couple of interesting facts.

Uppland is famous for having the highest concentration of rune-stones in the world, with as many as 1,196 inscriptions in stone left by the Vikings, and most important of all...it's the home of the nyckleharpa 'key fiddle'. My tour guide, Tim Rued, scheduled the sites that we visited according to each of our individual interests. Along with the many music venues we attended, I chose to visit the church in Björklinge that my ancestors would have attended, a tractor Museum in Viksta, a foundry, a Troll village, and sooooo much more. I was also able to enjoy the personal choices made by the other members of the tour. Judith Jones

District 10 member Tim Rued, an original member of CSOTFA back in 1967, plays many styles of fiddle music, including SWEDISH! He loves sharing this rich music in many ways, performing, teaching, and leading play-along sessions on Zoom. His most ambitious activity with Swedish fiddling is leading tours to Sweden. Since 2004 he has led 9 tours with musicians exploring the folk culture of Sweden, meeting Swedish fiddlers, and attending fiddle festivals.

A typical tour lasts 2 weeks, from a Wednesday to a Wednesday, allowing for two full weekends to take part in festivals. The time of year is at the end of June and beginning of July, when the weather is finest and there are music celebrations everywhere in the country.

Activities on the tour include visiting museums, walking through the big city of Stockholm and through small villages, staying in houses and hotels hundreds of years old, nature walks, and, of course, music.

The tours are very personalized, and limited to no more than 4 people besides Tim himself, who acts as tour guide, chauffeur, translator, and arranger for all travel within Sweden and all accommodations and meals during the tour. With the right preparation, the tour has visited the ancestral homes of many participants, even meeting never-before met relatives!

A Remembrance of Arthur Kee

Joe Weed is a producer, composer, and fiddler. He's a music historian who has published several films documenting traditional fiddling and its roots. His documentary The Waltz to Westphalia includes an extensive credit roll, with many notable fiddlers playing their versions of "Westphalia Waltz." Art Kee was among that number. Fine fiddling all.

Joe owns and manages a recording studio specializing in acoustic music at his property in the Santa Cruz Mountains. You can learn more about Joe Weed's rich background by visiting the web site www.joeweed.com .

When I asked Joe if there was anything he might contribute to a remembrance of Art Kee for The Soundpost, Joe graciously passed me this piece that he wrote. It's about both Art and Art's close buddy Jack Sadler. I am pleased to be able to share it. Bob Palasek

-- Here's a piece I wrote about Art and his close buddy Jack Sadler, who was one of the founders of the CBA, and who invited both Art and me to play in his bluegrass band, the Overlook Mountain Boys. I posted this on Facebook recently:

Two Old Bulls in the Bluegrass Corral Their friendship was forged from music and the warm hearts that led them both from difficult beginnings to stellar careers. Like Thomas Jefferson and John Adams, whose lights flickered low in tandem after so many years, they don't need to see each other. They know.

Jack Sadler called himself an "Okie," a survivor of the Dust Bowl and the Great Depression who walked the migrant farm camps in California, finding companionship among tens of thousands of similar refugees, all hung out to dry in a nation staggered by global disaster. Art Kee is a Texan, his family settling in Fort Worth. Bright and personable, Art skipped 3rd grade but then dropped out of high school to work at a supermarket. The family needed the money during those rough years.

Largely a self-taught musician, Art began on a mandolin loaned him by an uncle. Older brother Rush sold flower seeds, earning enough to buy a cheap tin fiddle. Their dad taught Rush to play "Boil the Cabbage," and seeing Rush's aptitude, spent \$7 to get him a real wooden fiddle, case and bow at Sears, Roebuck and Co. Art got the tin fiddle and learned to play. Their strict mother considered fiddle the devil's instrument and wouldn't allow music in the house. So Art and brother Rush played in the car or the barn or at friends' houses. By eighth grade, Art was fiddling with a group of pals at school, helped by a volunteer teacher.

Jack stumbled upon Janice, a stunningly beautiful, blonde sixteenyear-old. Deeply smitten with each other, they eloped. Then came the phone call to Jan's folks. Mom took the phone. "Now, Mrs. Abildgaard, I'm going to make sure your daughter has a good life, and ..."

"Jack," she cut him off, "it's 'Mom,' now. Welcome to the family." And with the help of Jan's folks, Jack made it through San Jose State and dental school and launched a successful practice in San Jose.

During the Korean War, Art joined the Navy, spending two and a half years in the Philippines. He finished his service in San Diego, and then hurried up to the Bay Area, where brother Rush was playing in bands. Art would sit in, and the brothers worked up twin fiddling arrangements. Soon Art enrolled in community college, where he took a class in music theory and another in violin. He's still proud of his "A" grade.

Local musicians asked Art to play bass with them, and his music career developed along with his ear. He graduated from San Jose State in three years, and became the City Planning Director for Campbell. Around the time that Jack Sadler, Jake Quesenberry, and Carl Pagter founded the California Bluegrass Association, Jack invited a few friends to form the Overlook Mountain Boys bluegrass band. Art Kee soon joined the group, playing bass, mandolin, or fiddle. Jack and Art became dear friends. Coming from similar impoverished backgrounds, they shared the drive to succeed professionally, the keen intellect and ready smile, and the warm and open hearts that they had grown up with.

Art: "At least I'm not an Okie!"

Jack: "Thank God I'm not from Fort Worth!"

Art: "We used to pee on the Texas-Oklahoma border line!"

Jack: At least we unbuttoned our pants before we did it!"

In the late 1970s, I met Jack at the Santa Clara Valley Old Time Fiddlers' Association, which held monthly outdoor jam sessions. Art was just realizing that he couldn't both play in a band and be the Planning Director for Campbell, so he "retired" from music for a while.

Jack offered me the fiddle spot in the Overlook Mountain Boys, and I gladly accepted. Soon, however, the band brought Art back in to add mandolin or bass.

One night in the early 80s, I won the \$1,000 dollar gold nuggets at a fiddle contest at the Gold Rush, a San Jose country music honky tonk. Art Kee was there, cheering me on heartily. I slipped the prized nuggets into my pocket and considered walking through the dark parking lot at 2:00 AM, trying to find my car. Art insisted on walking with me, my very own bodyguard! And then he drove right behind me all the way to Hiway 9 in Los Gatos.

Art clearly couldn't stay away from the fiddle, and he and his brother Rush continued to gather annually to play twin fiddles, often with Rush's wife Eve on piano. Eventually, Jack Sadler took up fiddle and Art became Jack's reluctant teacher. They had grown up listening to the same western swing and old time fiddling, and together began making the annual journey up to Weiser, Idaho, the site of the "National Oldtime Fiddlers' Contest and Festival." Bill Cummings, a boyhood friend of Jack's, lived in Weiser, so the trips became a virtual pilgrimage. Art began to compete, often placing highly. In 2005, he took home the coveted US championship trophy in the senior-seniors division.

Jack formed a cowboy band, "Lone Prairie." With singers Paul King and Joe Kimbro, they featured the rich male vocal trio sound of the Sons of the Pioneers. They brought in Bay Area favorite Ed Neff on fiddle, along with Karen Quick on Bass and Barbara Ann Barnett on accordion. The band became popular at many western music festivals. Both Art and Jack continued to play music and sing together into their advanced years. Jack's dear wife Jan passed away in the spring of 2022. When many gathered to celebrate Jan's life, Jack and Art and I clustered close together. Jack is wheelchair bound now, but Art and I sat close on either side of him, fiddling his favorites, "Faded Love" and "Maiden's Prayer."
